Management Committee

The Management Committee met on 17 October, prior to the AGM on 26 October.

As usual, the first item of new business was the report on finances up to 30 September. Overall, this showed that actual income was slightly more than budgeted for this financial year, while expenses were slightly less. Treasurer John Marsh reported on the audit of financial statements, which was successfully completed with no issues identified. He advised statements were on the web with the AGM documents.

It was noted that the cost of the audit was \$550, well below what might be otherwise expected. This was because the accounts were presented to the

auditor in a format that allowed easy examination. John's work on the audit was acknowledged and he was thanked for his effort in this important area of the administration of the organisation.

The President reported on several sessions conducted under the training program, and advised a program would be prepared shortly for 2018. The sessions being held within and between hubs were noted. These were welcomed and the presenters in training sessions were thanked for their services.

BSOL membership remains slightly above 1,000 and, as always, the change in the level and nature of the assistance sought from our organisation was broadly reviewed in general discussion. New members

come from a variety of channels, and trends continue to be monitored.

Noela Lewis reported that the Central Office was running smoothly, and that having two additional volunteers had assisted in its efficient operation. There were signs of more interest in this type of volunteering, and enquirers are fully advised of the opportunities in BSOL Central Office.

Ethna Brown will be taking on the additional duties as Newsletter Liaison as Erik Finger is retiring from the Management Committee at the AGM. He thanked the Committee members for the opportunity to serve the organisation and for the friendship and support they had given him in this time.

Digital Photography Group

This was followed by a lively debate and demonstration of Google Photos, which started life when Google bought Picasa and began adding to it. Now it seems it could take a lifetime to come to grips with its possibilities for storage, sharing and manipulation.

Helen provided details of a photographic competition currently being offered by the QEII Hospital, seeking images of healing places and spaces. We decided to adopt this as our next topic for photos, to be screened at our November 14 meeting.

Apple Group

Simon opened the meeting with 13 attendees, and discussed updates and issues on the new releases from Apple.

Apple Watch Series 3: There appear to be a number of teething problems with pairing of the GSM version and lack of support by reseller carriers. In particular Green Bubble SMS text messages may not work, but Blue Bubble iMessages do work. (Note: We expect that few BSOL members are likely to be early buyers of the Series 3 Apple Watch with GSM. I will not go into further detail of the operational process to resolve these issues here, but anyone wishing to purchase an Apple Watch Series 3 with GSM should seek more advice.)

iPhone X: Pre-orders can be lodged from 5 pm Brisbane time on 27 October. Demand is expected to be hot, so bookmark the ordering page and set yourself a reminder. Ensure

that your Apple ID and payment details are up to date beforehand.

iOS 11: This new operating system for iPhone 6 and later devices has many changes, Simon recommends that you download the user guide, which can be found here: <https://help.apple.com/iphone/11/>, then study the functions that you use regularly. Also check the availability of the features you use (or that you are looking forward to) in Australia, or even if they are available in Brisbane. Simon demonstrated how map features, such as new 3D Maps, are available for Sydney or the Gold Coast but not for Brisbane.

VPN (Virtual Private Network) – to use or not to use? That is a long-debated question. We have become increasingly reliant on insecure public wi-fi when we travel, and so we are more exposed to those intent on snooping on our communications, especially for ID theft and financial fraud. Using a VPN increases our

security by creating a secure “tunnel” through which our communications travel. This is a complex issue; Google “VPN Reviews” and read some of the articles from the more popular magazines.

Credit card and ID skimming:

Another very complex topic, but YES, data stored on modern credit cards or other “tap and go” proximity cards can be copied by others without the need to physically touch you or have your card. Can similar data stored on a payWave phone be skimmed? We do not know, but assume it can.

Care of phone and laptop batteries:

Allowing batteries in modern devices to go completely flat will not harm them; it is more likely to be beneficial and is recommended by many manufacturers.

Mac updates to High Sierra: Hold off and come to the next Apple Group Meeting on November 14!

Research Presentation QUT

I would like to thank members of the BSOL for participating in my research study at the QUT. The study was about understanding older adults' web information searching behaviour. Brief introduction is given below.

Older adults' internet usage is ever increasing. However, searching for targeted information on a website is never easy. For example, a health or travel website typically contains large amounts of information and hundreds or thousands of links. Successful information search on a website

depends upon a combination of human factors and system factors, and investigating all them in a single study is impossible. Therefore, this study was limited to two specific objectives.

First, investigate the impact of two human factors i.e. web familiarity and content knowledge in information search. Second, investigate the actions performed by older adults on a website when they faced problems in their information search. The procedure involved questionnaires, think-aloud protocol, video capture, and retrospective interviews. Two experiments were conducted using a health and travel website. The sampling involved 35 older adults

aged above 60 for each experiment, and a good number of BSOL members participated in the study.

Mentor Support Club

This month's meeting was chaired by Brian Korner, reinvigorated after his holiday. Brian opened the meeting with thanks to Steve for chairing the last meeting.

The NBN (national broadband network) was the first issue raised.

What is the normal connection procedure in areas using HFC (hybrid fibre coaxial) cable?

For premises currently without cable, NBN will connect cable to the exterior. Houses with cable already have this connection. After NBN is activated in an area, all home owners must then contact a retail service provider (RSP) to have a modem installed in the interior and be connected to the NBN.

Discussion then moved on to speed. OOola was mentioned as a reliable

measuring tool. An attendee was getting wildly varying speed measurements. A comment was made that bandwidth was being consumed by games and video. Another person commented on the slow download speeds in hotels.

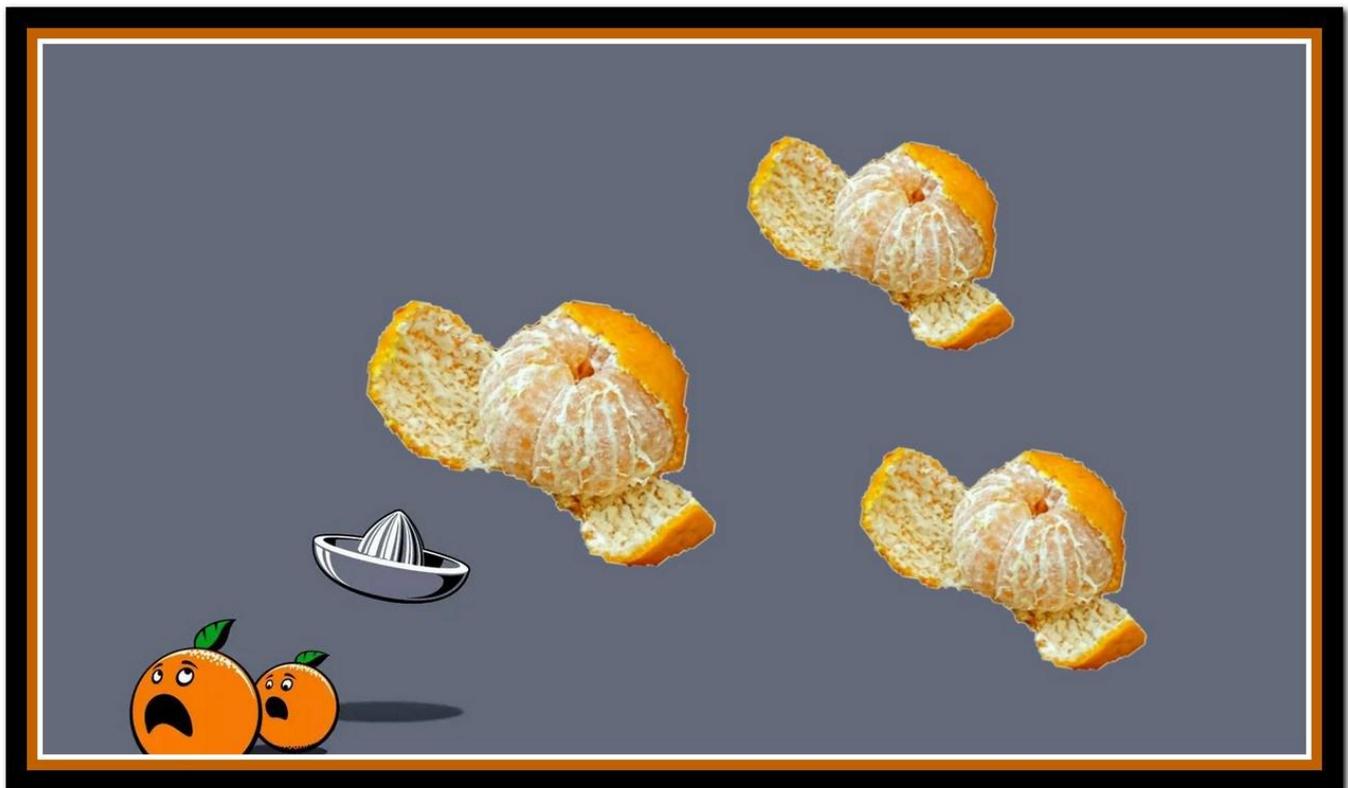
Other issues were then raised:

- The onscreen keyboard not working after connection to Skype.
 - Lastpass would not autofill for the Heritage Bank.
 - A USB-to-Bluetooth adapter can be used to connect a PC to a sound bar.
 - Organising photos on a Mac. (Answer: use ipPhoto.)
 - An attendee had a persistent popup asking to install Chrome browser, although it was already installed.
 - The availability of an optical-to-Bluetooth device for use with headphones.
- An anecdote from Brian on using an international travel SIM. Automatic connection to an expensive network leads to excessive data charges (Use manual choice of the network to stop this happening).
 - Naps2 scanner drive suggested for use when a manufacturer's drivers are no longer available.
 - A problem with Win 10 update continually failing and re-downloading (Only solution is to re-install Windows. Recommended that update history be checked regularly for such issues).

The meeting finished with a discussion on BSOL mentoring, in particular: the number of visits that should be made to each student.

It was noted that BSOL is seeing a change in clientele, with new members having much less experience with computers.
